Vern Neufeld Redekop is Professor of Conflict Studies at Saint Paul University, Canada. He is the former President of the Canadian Institute for Conflict Resolution. He is the author of *From Violence to Blessing: How an Understanding of Deep-Rooted Conflict Opens Paths to Reconciliation* (Novalis, 2002) and *Beyond Control: A Mutual Respect Approach to Protest Crowd-Police Relations* (Bloomsbury Academic, 2010).
